FPCC 2018 Leadership Retreat



San Damiano Retreat - Danville

Each year in January your Elders and Deacons attend a weekend retreat. This year's retreat, as in past years, was held at San Damiano Retreat, a beautiful hilltop retreat in the hills above Danville. The purpose of these retreats is to celebrate the past and prepare church leadership for the upcoming year. It is also a time where the Deacons and Elders come together for spiritual renewal and spiritual growth.

This year the Leadership Retreat was held January 19-21, (Friday evening through Sunday noon). Pastor Toby moderated, and our quest speaker was Reverend Dan Prout, president of Sierra International. Ministries teaching and healing ministry headquartered in Grass Valley. Pastor Dan's two main topics on leadership were "The 7 Prayer Principles for Leadership: How Jesus Did It." and "Leadership: How Moses Did It".

Pastor Dan's interactive and personal style of teaching gave us many new and relevant insights taken directly from scripture. On the first topic regarding Jesus' teachings on prayer we learned that Jesus' approach to prayer began with praising God for who He is and giving thanks to Him for all things. We noted that Jesus' prayers were frequent and often done alone in a quiet place. Jesus always sought the will of his Father. He made a point of praying in times of anguish and need, seeking strength and guidance from God. Regarding our own prayer, we found that Jesus teaches us that we need to acknowledge our sins and ask for forgiveness, thereby allowing our hearts and bodies to be cleansed.

In the second topic regarding how Moses exhibited leadership, we learned the importance of leading by example. We also learned how God chooses leaders, and that they may not always seem to be up to the task, but God gives them strength and even altering circumstances to ensure that His will is done. Leaders need to acknowledge God's power and fully rely on Him, while acknowledging their own weaknesses. Importantly, leaders must be teachable and also be encouragers of others.

Other highlights of the Retreat this year included the following:

- Beth Byrne's spirited direction of the group singing and piano accompaniment
- Rebecca Chase's direction of several group experiences throughout the conference that led to deep and personal sharing in small groups
- Remarkable prayer experiences and gaining assurance God heard those prayers and will empower us to do His will in our church
- Quality time for Elders and Deacons to interact with each other, to mutually share spiritual experiences, and to jointly address the goals and issues of our church in unity

We feel that this special weekend definitely left us spiritually renewed. Thanks to everyone who participated and to those who helped in various ways to make the 2018 Leadership Retreat one of the best ever. A special thanks goes to Pastor Toby, who planned the program and invited Pastor Dan to inspire and enlighten the leadership of our church through God's Word.

Sunday Time Change Experiment - Starting April 1

Starting on Easter Sunday, April 1, 2018, we will begin an experiment of starting Sunday mornings 30 minutes later, with Worship beginning at 10:00am and Sunday School completing at 12:30pm.

Over the past six months, Session has received feedback from the congregation FPCC's about Sunday morning schedule. New families with young children are beginning to join us for worship, although some are not yet attending consistently. At the same time, a few of our seniors have shared with us that they are increasingly finding it difficult to get to church by 9:30 am Sunday morning. Each individual and family is a cherished part of our church family and an important part of our Community.

This congregational input was discussed by our Elders, Deacons,

and staff at the January 19-21 Leadership Retreat. The leaders explored our current and alternative schedules for Sunday worship, fellowship, and Sunday School - including the advantages and disadvantages of each. The overwhelming majority starting our Sunday morning activities (choir practice, worship, fellowship, and education hour) 30 minutes later will allow FPCC to reach out to those around us and minister to our Community more effectively. This is consistent with the Vision Statement in our 2017 Mission Study: "As a community hub, connect with the needs of people, joyfully sharing Jesus and serving where God calls".

Accordingly, at the January Session meeting held at the end of the retreat, Session decided on an experiment to attract and encourage families with young

children to join us in worship, and to make it a little easier for some older folks. We did this in large part because we very much value their fellowship with us and want to make it a little easier for our congregation to worship together as a church family. This fivemonth experiment will start on Easter Sunday, April 1, 2018, with our worship service starting at 10:00 am, and the fellowship time starting at 11:00 am. There is no Sunday School hour scheduled for Easter Sunday. In the weeks following Easter, worship will again start at 10:00 am, with our fellowship time from 11:00 to 11:30 am, and our Sunday School hour starting at 11:30 am. At the end of August, we will evaluate the experiment to determine if it has been fruitful and whether it should be continued.

Sound System Update

Many of you may have noticed that our sound system has been experiencing issues the past few months. Teeth grinding feedback, mysterious loss of volume. improper operation of T-Coil loop, weird ringing, hums, and noise have all plaqued the system. We have attempted to correct issues as they arise, but the reality of the situation is that the sound system was installed 20 years ago and has been failing piece by piece for a couple of years. The past two directors of worship and music, Jim and Paul, each commented on the need to replace the system during their tenure, but with our

unsure future during discernment, no action was taken, and Paul was unable to complete the process of upgrading the sanctuary prior to his departure.

The Flock has been trying to help with the use of their sound system to bridge the gap, but the reality is that a band's small venue PA is not designed to handle this kind of building and make our worship as inspirational as it can be. In fact, the failing sound system has become a distraction to worship. The good news is Session has approved worship and music to take bids for a new sound system.


The current system installed in \$40.000. Like 1998 cost technology, costs have come down and capability has gotten better in the past 20 years. We are currently looking at a cost of about \$25,000 to revamp and upgrade the system. Bids are being taken to get the best bang for our buck, and we hope to be able to replace the system in early spring. Depending on the total cost, a Capital Campaign may not be out of the question to help fund the new system. Please prayerfully consider whether you may be able to help should a capital campaign be initiated. God Bless. ₽

Adult Education

On February 18th Kristin Harvey will be wrapping up her current series of classes based on the book *You Lost Me*.

There will be no class on February 25th due to the Annual meeting.

After we wrap up the 6-week study with Kristin Harvey based on the book You Lost Me, we'll be looking at how to follow up. How do we reach out to folks we'd like to share the Good News with, like our younger family members and their friends? How do we prepare our congregation to receive a new pastor into a growing community of faith, reversing our shrinking numbers? Churchless people are all around us -- among our closest loved ones, at our workplaces, in our neighborhoods. And more and more, they are becoming the norm. The number of churchless adults in the US has grown by nearly one-third in the past decade. Yet the startling truth is that many of these people claim they are *looking* for a genuine, powerful encounter with God-but they just don't find it in church. What are they (or we) missing? How can we better reach out to them? What can we say or do that would inspire them to want to join a community of faith? Beginning March 4th and continuing through Palm Sunday, Ann Keirns leads this Sunday School adventure: March 4, What's next?; March 11 -Reaching the Skeptics (Atheists & Agnostics); March 18th - Faith, Future Tense (Unchurched Adults are seeking...); March 25th - Why Churches Matter (Advocating for Church in Post-Christian Culture).

Children's Worship & Education

The Children's Ministry Team held a Christmas Event in the Sunday School rooms on Saturday December 16th, 2017. Thirteen children and several adult helpers walked through a progressive story of Jesus' birth. In each room, children heard a piece of the story and collected a representative item or ornament. Maji is eighty miles from the national electric grid and not scheduled to be added to the grid anytime soon. The answer to this problem is to bring solar power there. So Caroline has started a project, MaDeCo, Maji Development Coalition, Community emPOWERment in Ethiopia, which the Great Commission Team voted to start supporting in 2018. We supported Caroline for

after her husband's death, she was called to this exciting new ministry.

Caroline is working with members from the church her father helped start and a coalition of women to bring solar powered electricity to Maji. Her starting goal is three hundred homes and the medical clinic. Medical teams must use flashlights for babies born at night, sometimes holding the flashlights in their mouths when both hands are needed. In response to that need, Caroline found a provider for a 50 watt unit, which was installed in September 2017.

But there are other problems. Classrooms are so dark, students cannot see to write in their notebooks in the rainy season. Women have to tend to a sick child by candlelight. Bringing light to these dark areas at night can make a difference between surviving and thriving. The

New Ministry for Winter Nights Homeless Family Shelter

Recognizing a need, Winter Nights is trial-testing a Parking Lot Ministry. It was noticed that some of the families on the WN waiting list are sleeping in their cars. A church in Pittsburg is providing parking in their lot with a watchperson on duty overnight and access to facilities in the host church during January and

February. The families will also be able to use the shower and laundry facilities at the Oasis Center, associated with St Vincent de Paul, during the day. The host church provides a light breakfast: fruit, juice boxes, granola or breakfast bars. If the program is successful, Winter Nights plans to extend it during the 2018-19 season.
