

Deny Yourself

The Way of the Cross


³⁴ Then he called the crowd to him along with his disciples and said: "Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me.

³⁵ For whoever wants to save their life will lose it, but whoever loses their life for me and for the gospel will save it. ³⁶ What good is it for someone to gain the whole world, yet forfeit their soul?"

- Mark 8:34-36 (NIV)

This is one of those passages that's so familiar, sometimes we don't really think about what it really means. I was reminded to reevaluate it during a recent Wednesday night small group class. We are studying along with Andy Stanley from his series "Follow" where he challenges our concept of what it means to be a Jesus follower.

Just looking at verse 34, if we put ourselves in the mind(s) of the original hearers of this word, we would be terrified. In first century Palestine, Roman crosses were an all too familiar sight. Original hearers would interpret the words of Jesus to mean, "deny my desire to live and instead follow Jesus to my death". I suppose the good news for us today is that we're not physically following Jesus from town to town, inspiring people to kill us for believing in a Rabbi that's upsetting the way things have been done for 1500 years.



We have mentally watered this statement down, white-washed it to match our context of culture as it applies to us. For some it boils down to an advertisement I saw recently, "FOR LESS THAN THE COST OF A CUP OF COFFEE PER DAY, YOU CAN SPONSOR A CHILD IN NEED." Accurate as this statement may be, many have come to believe that "denying myself" that cup of coffee to save one of the "least of these" equates to picking up our cross.

Andy Stanley would probably say, this is likely the reaction of what he calls "Consumers of Christianity". His definition of consumer is this: "people that attend church an hour or two per week, want the service to meet their expectations, so they can feel good when they leave, and may or may not have given up their cup of coffee per day to sponsor a child in poverty"

There is a deeper theological truth however for followers of Jesus: When you follow Jesus, there **will** be a personal cost. Following

Jesus completely, may damage some relationships, while building others. A non-believing parent, sibling, friend, may not understand why you open your home to foster kids, the homeless, or a fellow believer that is struggling, because their past may include prison. Non-

believing children may contest an aging parent's desire to leave a bequest to their church. Also, friendships that you have counted on for years may become strained simply by asking, "May I pray with you"? You may have to sever relations with non-believing friend to avoid times when their influence may be stronger than your ability to follow Jesus. Consider our brothers and sisters in cultures where following Jesus can ostracize them from their community. Many followers of Jesus are disowned by family and friends. Some are killed for their relationship with Jesus.

"From Nov. 1, 2015, to Oct. 31, 2016, Open Doors, a nonprofit that serves persecuted Christians, documented as many as 1,207 Christians who were killed around the globe for faith-related reasons during the 2017 list's reporting period. This is a conservative estimate since it only includes documented cases and does not include statistics from North Korea and large areas of Iraq and Syria." (Tanner, April 14, 2017)

When Jesus continues in verse 35, Andy Stanley puts an interesting twist on it – *“Whoever wants to save their life ... (that’s pretty much everyone, since most of us prefer to live) ... will lose it”* Andy points out that all of us eventually lose our life, Christ followers, non-Christ followers, even consumers of Christianity. All of us are going to die. Let that truth sink in for a second, then read the last bit of verse 35, *“but whoever loses their life for me and for the gospel will save it.”* Andy points out the brilliance of Jesus for using this phrase in His ministry. Jesus has established that we are all going to die, (lose our life)...so, why not make it count for something? Theologians around the world would caution me to consider the afterlife implications inherent in this statement. But we know that we are already saved through faith, so dying on a missionary trip in a war-torn region of the earth is not going to earn us any *extra* points toward saving our lives. As Andy pointed out, we are going to die. Our choice is this, when we

die, will it be as a follower of Jesus? Did our life as a follower make a difference in the Kingdom. Did our choice to follow Jesus, rather than be a consumer of Christianity, make someone’s life better. Did we plant seeds of the Gospel to grow in the hearts of some part of humanity? The saving of our life does have eternal implications, but more importantly, when we save our lives as used in this context, it means we set aside, consecrate, and/or sanctify our lives for God’s purpose.

Jesus returns to the concept of denying one’s self in verse 36. *“What good is it for someone to gain the whole world, yet forfeit their soul?”* When we are self-serving, gaining the world for our short time here on earth, what good is that if we forfeit the eternal part of our being. I am reminded of a sermon by Francis Chan where he took a couple hundred feet of rope and put a single row of duct tape on one end. That 2-inch piece of tape he said, “represents our time on earth”. The remaining 199’ 10”, which when stretched out exited the building, is eternity. That is the afterlife we are promised as followers of Jesus. Francis goes on to say that we often spend 199’ 10” worth of our energy on the 2-inches of tape rather than the other way around. If there is an afterlife, shouldn’t we focus on making the 199’ 10” count, since that is where our eternity resides?

So, most people still believe there is, or may be an afterlife. This means they also believe in an eternal component of our being, or soul. Andy asks the question, “If you found out that you had lost your soul, what would you give to get it back?” The answer Everything. We would give everything to earn back our soul. Jesus’ question becomes more real and less an exercise in metaphor when placed in the context of following. Each opportunity that presents where we have the choice to deny ourselves and follow Jesus is a crossroads. We will fail often to deny ourselves, because it is not consistent with survival instinct; it’s not part of our culture; and It doesn’t fit with our “take care of number one” mindset. Yet, I can tell you from personal experience that every time I have chosen to follow, though it may be uncomfortable, it may seem impossible, God comforts, God provides, and the reward is a deep and lasting joy. God truly does deliver a peace that surpasses understanding.

I urge you my brothers and sisters to tune into God, so you may more easily recognize a crossroads moment. I pray that you would choose to follow Jesus, even when that means giving up more than a cup of coffee per day, and remember Andy’s question when you stand at a crossroads of your life.

What would you give for your soul?

African Children's Choir January 2nd



Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA)

PDA is offering immediate aid to the communities impacted by Hurricane Michael. This joins responses already underway for those impacted by hurricane Florence, Typhoon Mangkhut, and other international disasters that have suffered a lack of media coverage.

Hurricane Michael struck the Florida panhandle with devastating winds and storm surge, causing loss of life. The storm then cut a path across the southeast, moving through the same areas impacted by Hurricane Florence just a few weeks ago.

PDA is deploying teams to affected communities. Emergency aid, assistance in the development of a short-term response plan, as well as a ministry of presence will be the priorities of the initial response.

Meanwhile, areas impacted by Mangkhut and Florence have received aid and support through the gifts of Presbyterians like you. In humility, with God and your continued support, we will continue to help draw hope out of the chaos, together.
