John Calvin (Part 2) A Job or a Calling?

This is the second installment in a series by Pastor Johanna on one of her favorite theologians—John Calvin, the founder of Presbyterianism, and on his instruction manual on the fundamentals of the faith—Institutes of the Christian Religion.

What's the difference between a job and a calling? Is there a difference? In our contemporary 24/7 work world, we are obsessed with achievement, keep working after hours and on vacation, and measure our personal worth by how much we can get done.

What can a 16th-century theologian possibly have to say to help us navigate the frenetic pace of our modern lives? In the case of John Calvin, quite a bit. Calvin would tell us to pay attention to our vocations.

When we think of the word "vocation," we may think about a person's profession—the job to which their education, training, and aptitudes have fit them. But for Calvin this word means something more. It's the work God has given a person to focus on as a means of controlling the human appetite to have a hand in every pie, to quote an old adage.

Calvin writes, "God knows the boiling restlessness of the human mind, the fickleness with which it is borne hither and thither, its eagerness to hold opposites at one time in its grasp, its ambition. Therefore, lest all things should be thrown into confusion by our folly and rashness, he has assigned distinct duties to each in the different modes of life."

God knows that trying to do it all is an inherent part of being human. So Calvin says God has given each one of us "distinct duties," a calling, a vocation. God has set us up not for scattered chaos, but for focused success.

Calvin is not primarily concerned with the modern idea of finding fulfillment through work. He's more interested in the way our work can function to slow us down, to relieve our anxieties, to prevent us from being "always driven about at random."

Sound unfamiliar? We typically think of work as a source of stress, something that's hard. But for Calvin, if we are employing our God-given vocation, work should be the opposite, a source of peace and assurance.

Calvin would have us remember that we live in a world full of other people, each with their own efforts to make on behalf of their fellow human beings. We don't have to do everything!

Calvin would also have us remember that this world is ultimately God's responsibility. More often than we realize, it's more needful that we get out of His way than that we take on that one extra thing.

Bellow for Bellows

Our masterful organ is showing its age. The pipes stand in majesty, manuals lie staged.

But bellows are leaking, a band-aid won't do. Replacement is crucial or silence is due.

The bellows are lungs that gather the air, which flows through the pipes with pressurized care.


Producing the sounds, in glorious array, that brighten our worship on each Sabbath Day.

But bellows are leaking, their future is bleak, and bellows are pricey, the budget is weak.

So, Bellow for Bellows! The organ is dear! And save up your dollars to bring it some cheer.

Our "Bellow for Bellows" campaign to replace the aging organ bellows continues. To recap, the leather bellows are the originals, and the two wind reservoirs have withstood the heat and cold in the pipe chambers for almost 70 years. They are now rapidly deteriorating and are leaking pressurized air that gives the organ its voice; they are on the verge of failure due to the aging leather. The pressure is now on us to replace them, which will ensure the winding system remains in good condition for many decades. The total cost of repair is \$28,750. The Worship and Music Committee set a fundraising goal at \$20,000 to complete these repairs.





Update:

We started with \$10,680 in the Worship and Music Dedicated Organ Rebuilding Fund Account before we started the campaign.

So far the campaign has raised a total of \$12,530 as follows:

- June 2019 \$4,000
- Dec. 2019 \$6,890
- Jan. 2020 \$1,640

We need an additional \$7,470 to reach our fundraising goal of \$20,000. If generosity surprises us all, any additional contributions would go to replace the Cathedral Chimes, which is a \$4,000 expense.

We cannot thank you enough for your generosity.

I am taking on a new kind of challenge. I am now the "go-to" person for helping guests become members of our community. We had 137 people walk in the door on Sundays (and sign in!) during 2019. Of those, at least 36 came back again! Eight people became members, and 6 are regular attenders. Pastor Johanna and I are working on data systems to keep better track of new (and current) friends so no one is overlooked. Here's a reminder of ways you can be helpful:

- Guests come in every door.
- Be ready to greet anyone you don't recognize.
- Remember why you're here, and you may get a chance to share your story!
- Ushers have a gift for guests! Make sure they know (or tell an usher).
- We need contact information so I can send a Welcome note:
 - o point out the Welcome Card in the pews, or
 - pass them the Friendship Pad (with your information already in it as a sample)
 - Even if all they write is a name and an email or phone number, that's fine!
- Invite guests to join you for coffee in the Fellowship Hall.
 - Commonalities are easy to find when you ask questions!
